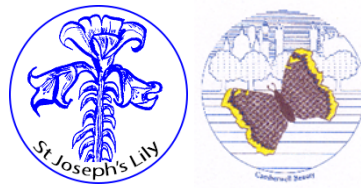

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Approved by:	Full Governing Body
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1. Aims

St Joseph's Camberwell Catholic Schools' Federation aims to meet its obligations with regards to school attendance by:

- Promoting good attendance and reducing absence, including persistent absence
- Ensuring every pupil has access to full-time education to which they are entitled
- Acting early to address patterns of absence

We will also support parents to perform their legal duty to ensure their children of compulsory school age attend regularly, and will promote and support punctuality in attending lessons.

We recognise that regular school attendance is vital. Children need to attend regularly if they are to enjoy the educational opportunities provided within the school and make consistently good progress. Absence can lead to educational disadvantage for a child and place them at risk of not achieving their full potential.

Education is important. Missing school means missing out. Children should be at school, on time and ready to learn, every day the school is open, unless the reason for the absence is unavoidable. Permitting absence from school without a good reason is an offence by the parent that can result in legal action by the Local Authority.

Many children are sometimes ill or unhappy about attending. Families can be going through unsettled times that can make regular school attendance difficult. Any problems with regular attendance, especially any concerns about possible bullying or learning difficulties, are best sorted out between the school, the parents and the child at an early stage. It is never better to cover up children's absences or to give in to pressure to excuse them from attending. This gives the impression that school attendance does not matter and may make things worse.

2. Legislation and guidance

This policy also refers to the DfE's guidance on the school census which explains the persistent absence threshold.

3. School Procedures

3.1 Attendance register

By law, schools (except those where all pupils are boarders) are required to keep an attendance register, and all pupils must be placed on this register.

The attendance register will be taken at the start of the first session of each school day and once during the second session. It will mark whether every pupils is:

- Present
- Attending an approved off-site educational activity
- Absent
- Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances

Any amendment to the attendance register will include:

- The original entry
- The amended entry
- The reason for the amendment
- The date on which the amendment was made
- The name and position of the person who made the amendment

See appendix 1 for the DfE attendance codes.

Every entry in the attendance register will be preserved for 3 years after the date on which the entry was made.

Pupils must arrive in school by 8:45 for Juniors and for Infants on each school day.

Junior School

The register for the first session will be taken at 8:45 am for Junior pupils and will be kept open until 9:15 am. The register for the second session will be taken at 1:30pm and will be kept open until 1:40 pm.

Infant School

The register for the first session will be taken at 8:45 am for Infant pupils and will be kept open until 9:15 am.

The register for the second session will be taken at 1:05 pm and will be kept open until 1:15 pm.

3.2 Unplanned absence

Parents must notify the school on the first day of an unplanned absence – for example, if their child is unable to attend due to ill health – by **8:30am** or as soon as practically possible (see also section 6).

Absence due to illness will be authorised unless the school has a genuine concern about the authenticity of the illness.

If the authenticity of the illness is in doubt, the school may ask parents to provide medical evidence, such as a doctor's note, prescription, appointment card or other appropriate form of evidence. We will not ask for medical evidence unnecessarily.

If the school is not satisfied about the authenticity of the illness, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised and parents will be notified of this in advance.

3.3 Medical or dental appointments

Missing registration for a medical or dental appointment is counted as an authorised absence; advance notice is required for authorising these absences.

However, we encourage parents to make medical and dental appointments out of school hours where possible. Where this is not possible, the pupil should be out of school for the minimum amount of time necessary.

Parents are required to inform the office in advance if their child has a medical or dental appointment.

Applications for other types of absence in term time must also be made in advance. Information relating to whether the school can authorise such absence can be found in section 4.

3.4 Lateness and punctuality

A pupil who arrives late but before the register has closed will be marked as late, using the appropriate code.

A pupil who arrives after the register has closed will be marked as absent, using the appropriate code.

3.5 Following up absence

The school will follow up any absences to ascertain the reason, ensure proper safeguarding action is taken where necessary, identify whether the absence is approved or not and identify the correct attendance code to use.

3.6 Reporting to parents

The school will report to parents on attendance at the autumn and spring term parents' evening and also in the end of year written report.

4. Authorised and unauthorised absence

4.1 Granting approval for term-time absence

Headteachers may not grant any leave of absence to pupils during term time unless they consider there to be 'exceptional circumstances'.

The school considers each application for term-time absence individually, taking into account the specific facts, circumstances and relevant context behind the request. A leave of absence is granted at the headteacher's discretion.

Valid reasons for **authorised absence** include:

- Illness and medical/dental appointments – as explained in sections 3.2 and 3.3

- Religious observance – where the day is exclusively set apart for religious observance by the religious body to which the pupil's parents belong. If necessary, the school will seek advice from the parents' religious body to confirm whether the day is set apart
- Traveller pupils travelling for occupational purposes – this covers Roma, English, and Welsh Gypsies, Irish and Scottish Travellers, Showmen (fairground people) and Circus people, Bargees (occupational boat dwellers) and New Travellers. Absence may be authorised only when a Traveller family is known to be travelling for occupational purposes and has agreed this with the school, but it is not known whether the pupil is attending educational provision.

4.2 Legal Sanctions

Schools can fine parents for the unauthorised absences of their child from school, where the child is of compulsory school age.

If issued with a penalty notice, parents must pay £60 within 21 days or £120 within 28 days. The payment must be made directly to the local authority.

The decision on whether or not to issue a penalty notice ultimately rests with the headteacher, following the local authority's code of conduct for issuing penalty notices. This may take into account:

- The number of unauthorised absences occurring within a rolling academic year
- One-off instances of irregular attendance, such as holidays taken in term time without permission
- Where an excluded pupil is found in a public place during school hours without a justifiable reason

If the payment has not been made after 28 days, the local authority can decide whether to prosecute the parent or withdraw the notice.

5. Strategies for promoting attendance

Recognition for good attendance and punctuality forms an integral part of the school programme to demonstrate its importance and relevance to the children's education and personal development. At each Friday assembly, classes with 100% attendance and 100% punctuality for the current week are praised. This information is then shared with parents via the school website. Each month, attendance is also reported via the school newsletter and the class with the best attendance is once again celebrated.

At the end of each term the pupil(s) with 100% attendance and 100% punctuality are awarded a certificate.

6. Attendance monitoring

The attendance officer monitors pupil absence on a weekly basis. Parents are expected to call the school in the morning if their child is going to be absent due to ill health (see section 3.2). If a child is ill for more than one day, parents are expected to phone the school each day to report their child's absence.

If a pupil's absence goes above 5 days we will contact the parents to discuss the reasons for this. If, after contacting parents, a pupil's absence continues to rise, we will consider involving an education welfare officer, or one of the team from Southwark early Help.

The persistence absence threshold is 10%. If a pupil's individual overall absence rate is greater than or equal to 10%, the pupil will be classified as a persistent absentee.

Pupil –level absence data is collected each term and published at national and local authority level through the DfE's school absence national statistics releases. The underlying school-level absence data is published

alongside the national statistics. We compare our attendance data to the national average and share this with governors.

As a school we monitor the attendance of every pupil and groups of pupils on a weekly basis.

7. Roles and responsibilities

7.1 The governing body

The governing board is responsible for monitoring attendance figures for the whole school on at least a termly basis. It also holds the headteacher to account for the implementation of this policy. The Resources committee is responsible for discussing and monitoring attendance and then the chair will feedback every term to the FGB.

7.2 The headteacher

The headteacher is responsible for ensuring this policy is implemented consistently across the federation, and for monitoring school-level absence data and reporting it to governors. The headteacher also supports other staff in monitoring the attendance of individual pupils and issues fixed-penalty notices, where necessary.

7.3 The attendance Officer

The attendance officer:

- Monitors attendance data at the school and individual pupil level
- Reports concerns about attendance to the headteacher
- Works with external agencies to tackle persistent absence
- Arranges calls and meeting with parents to discuss attendance issues
- Advises the headteacher when to issue fixed-penalty notices
- Liaises with the EHT/HOS about pupils who may be reported as CME (Children missing in education)

7.4 Class teacher

Class teachers are responsible for recording attendance on a daily basis, using the correct codes, and submitting this information to the school office.

7.5 Office Staff

Office staff are expected to take calls from parents about absence and record it on the school system.

8. Monitoring arrangements

This policy will be reviewed every 2 years by the Attendance Lead. At every review, the policy will be shared with governing body.

9. Taking a Pupil off the Register:

The Executive Headteacher will authorise the taking of a pupil's name off the register in accordance with the current regulations.

10. Links with other policies

This policy is linked to our child protection and safeguarding policy.

Appendix 1: attendance codes

The following codes are taken from the DfE's guidance on school attendance.

Code	Definition	Scenario
/	Present (am)	Pupil is present at morning registration
\	Present (pm)	Pupil is present at afternoon registration
L	Late arrival	Pupil arrives late before register has closed
B	Off-site educational activity	Pupil is at a supervised off-site educational activity approved by the school
D	Dual registered	Pupil is attending a session at another setting where they are also registered
J	Interview	Pupil has an interview with a prospective employer/educational establishment
P	Sporting activity	Pupil is participating in a supervised sporting activity approved by the school
V	Educational trip or visit	Pupil is on an educational visit/trip organised, or approved, by the school

Code	Definition	Scenario
Authorised absence		
C	Authorised leave of absence	Pupil has been granted a leave of absence due to exceptional circumstances
E	Excluded	Pupil has been excluded but no alternative provision has been made
H	Authorised holiday	Pupil has been allowed to go on holiday due to exceptional circumstances
I	Illness	School has been notified that a pupil will be absent due to illness
M	Medical/dental appointment	Pupil is at a medical or dental appointment
R	Religious observance	Pupil is taking part in a day of religious observance
S	Study leave	Year 11 pupils is on study leave during their public examinations
T	Gypsy, Roma and Traveller absence	Pupil from a Traveller community is travelling, as agreed with the school
Unauthorised absence		
G	Unauthorised holiday	Pupil is on holiday that was not approved by the school
N	Reason not provided	Pupil is absent for an unknown reason (this code should be amended when the reason emerges, or replaced with code O if no reason for absence has been provided after a reasonable amount of time)
O	Unauthorised absence	School is not satisfied with reason for pupil's absence
U	Arrival after registration	Pupil arrived at school after the register closed

X	Not required to be in school	Pupil of non-compulsory school age is not required to attend
Y	Unable to attend due to exceptional circumstances	School site is closed, there is disruption to travel as a result of local/national emergency, or pupil is in custody
Z	Pupil not on admission register	Register set up but pupil has not yet joined the school
#	Planned school closure	Whole or partial school closure due to half-term/bank holiday/INSET day
X01	Non-compulsory school age absence -not counted in possible attendances	
X02	Pupil self-isolating with Coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms	
X03	Pupil self-isolating due to potential contact with a confirmed case of coronavirus (COVID-19) INSIDE school setting	
X04	Pupil self-isolating due to potential contact with a confirmed case of coronavirus (COVID-19) OUTSIDE school setting	
X05	Pupils required to self-isolate as part of quarantine (after arriving in the UK from a non-exempt country or territory)	
X06	Pupil not in school because they have been advised specially by their Doctor or public health authority that they are clinically extremely vulnerable and should not attend	
X07	Pupil advised specifically not to be attend school as part of restrictions to education set out in Government advice
